How Do Profoundly Deaf Children Learn to Read?

The bottom line for many deaf children born to deaf parents is that, although they are native (and fluent) users of a language (sign language), that language is not the language they are learning to read Deaf Children Born to Hearing Parents Ninety percent of deaf children in the United States are born to hearing parents, who are not likely

About 1 in 500 infants is born with or develops hearing loss
